A Message from the Health Office

UGH! BED BUGS!

Bed bugs have become a very common problem these days. They are reddish brown, oval and flat, about the size of an apple seed. Bedbugs don't care if where they live is clean or dirty. All they need is a source of blood to eat and plenty of hiding places. During the day, they hide in the cracks and crevices of beds, box springs, headboards and bed frames. They also live happily under peeling paint and loose wallpaper, under carpeting near baseboards, in upholstered furniture seams, and under light switch plates or electrical outlets. Bedbugs don't usually stay on a person after they have eaten, but they might hide in clothes or luggage left nearby on the floor. Then they go wherever you take the clothes or luggage. They can crawl about as fast as a ladybug, so they can easily travel between floors and rooms in hotels or apartment complexes.

Bedbug bites are not painful at first and can go unnoticed for hours or days. They are found most often on the upper body, neck, arms and shoulders. Bedbugs tend to leave straight rows of bites, unlike some other insects that leave bites here and there. Some develop itching, red welts or swelling the day after being bitten. Many people do not react at all to the bite of a bedbug.

Bedbugs do not carry or transmit diseases although the bite may become irritated or infected.

It is hard to find bedbugs, because they are small and mostly come out only at night, but they are not too small to see. Some signs of a bedbug infestation may be found on linens and mattresses. People sometimes roll onto bedbugs while they sleep, leaving bloodstains on the sheets. Live bedbugs leave clusters of dark brown or black spots of dried waste on infested surfaces. Bedbugs also give off a subtle, sweet, stale odor.

Bed bugs are very difficult to get rid of because they can hide away and live for a year without eating.

Getting rid of them takes the combined efforts of the homeowner or tenant and landlord and a Pest Control Professional.

The occupant of the home must reduce clutter, especially around the bed. Mattresses should not be on the floor and he/she should make the bed an "island"- not touching the walls on any side. Frequent vacuuming and sealing cracks and crevices with caulk helps. Following the instructions and tips of the Pest Control Professional is the best way to get rid of and prevent bed bug infestation.

It is not shameful to have bed bugs and important not to hide or ignore that you do. Clothes and other articles that must be sent to school or carried to other places should be kept sealed in plastic bags or bins as soon as you bring them home, to avoid carrying bed bugs to where you are going. Wash clothes and dry for at least 30 minutes in a hot dryer before sealing them in bags. This will help prevent the spread of bed bugs.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, the US Centers for Disease Control and Dr. Richard Pollack, former entomologist for the Harvard School of Public Health and current President and Chief Scientific Officer for IdentifyUS, a service for identifying pests and providing guidance on getting rid of them all state that children should not be excluded from attending school if a bed bug is found on them.

Seeing one or two bed bugs, especially in an environment where there are no mattresses to provide a sleeping person for their food supply does not mean that that environment is infested with them and extermination is not an appropriate action to take under such circumstances.

Medicaid Service Coordination

Did you know:

FEN provides Medicaid Service Coordination???

What is Medicaid Service Coordination?

Medicaid Service Coordination (MSC) assists persons with developmental disabilities and their families in gaining access to services and supports appropriate to their needs. MSC is provided by qualified service coordinators and uses a person-centered planning process in developing, implementing, and maintaining an Individualized Service Plan. Medicaid Service Coordination is a Medicaid-funded program, so there is no

direct cost to you.

Who is eligible for Medicaid Service Coordination?

Adults and children of all ages who meet the legal definition of having an intellectual or developmental disability and live in Broome, Tioga or Chenango County.

How do I apply for Medicaid Service Coordination?

Any individual who is new to MSC, needs to go through the Front Door. OPWDD's Front Door is designed to improve the way people learn about and access available service options while giving individuals as many opportunities as possible to direct their own service plans. There is a Front Door Team at each OPWDD Regional Office.

The Front Door supports a person-centered approach for people with developmental disabilities which prioritizes individual choices, needs, and desires in making decisions. Once the individual is determined eligible then the process to enroll in MSC can be started.

Courthouse Children's Center Activity "Egg Carton Flowers"

Here is a fun activity to share with your children from the Arts & Craft table at the Courthouse Children's Center.



You will need: Egg Carton - Straw - Pom poms - Scissors - Glue

Method:

Cut four containers out of an egg carton.

You can trim the edges to give a rounder shape for the flower petals. Let your child color or paint or decorate the inside of the egg carton. Let them glue the egg carton petals to the paper

Let them glue a straw on the paper for the stem. Or draw a stem with a crayon or pencil.

Your child can finish the flower by gluing a pom-pom, cotton ball or small piece of scrunched up tissue in the middle of each flower.
