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From the Desk of the Executive Director

As we close the year it is always good to look back and reflect on all we have accomplished and review areas we need to look at in the coming year. We continue to grow and prosper. That is a very difficult task in the not-for-profit world today. We continue to look at what we have accomplished in the past and spend a considerable amount of time and energy looking to the future.

Obviously the big story this year has been the COVID-19 virus. We shut down in-person programming in the early spring and the majority of staff worked from home. We opened up a very successful in-person early childhood summer program and prepared for the fall. We re-opened in the fall and have served as many children as we possibly could, and our enrollment and attendance has been excellent. We were not unlike others in the community and had to deal with some challenging times as several of our staff tested positive for COVID-19. We followed all Public Health guidelines in dealing with that and continued operating in a safe manner. We continue to follow all public health, safety and hygiene protocols. The staff have done an extraordinary job in keeping the agency moving forward.

As we approach the Holiday season, it is a great time for reflection. Here is what I see: every program and service we provide is consistent with our mission and vision. We need to continue to provide quality services in everything we do. We need to step up advocacy to increase revenue so we can increase salaries and benefits for our staff. We need to improve communications internally with staff and externally with the communities we serve. We need to find a way to attract more staff to our agency. Every little change we make, makes us stronger. We have to take risks, but calculated risks. We continue to see the challenges of quality early childhood care and education. The most important job in the world, caring for our young children, should not be the lowest paid. The number of child care centers in the area that have closed or have had significant issues is concerning. There are still more centers that are on the brink of closing in the near future. The long-term answer continues to be advocacy, support, and a cooperative effort between government, not-for-profits, and the business community.

At this time last year we were awarded a Homeless Housing and Assistance Project for 19 apartments in the city of Binghamton. This was a cooperative effort between our agency, the City of Binghamton, and OTDA. Construction began in the spring and we plan to have the project turned over to us by the end of December. Tenants for occupancy will be selected in January 2021 and hopefully move in on or about the first of February. Housing is an area where we will expand over the coming years. We will once again host our annual coat drive and Adopt-A-Family program. We look forward to offering these programs year after year. We understand this will be a challenge with the health crisis but we see an increased need and will do all that we can to assist our families with the help of the community.

We have been very fortunate to have a tremendously supportive and talented Board of Directors, that coupled with a strong organization and a staff that has placed us in a great position for the future. We thank you for your past support of our Agency and look forward to future partnership opportunities.

Special Education Services Program

We certainly have gotten off to an unprecedented start to the school year. Among the change and uncertainty in our homes, schools, and communities, the SES staff has remained determined to provide positive stable surroundings and continued support to our students. Last summer we serviced 31 students in in-person classes where many of them also received therapy services. We also provided 167 evaluations in speech therapy, occupational therapy, physical therapy, and psychological and educational reviews. This fall we are currently running in-person programs for 39 SES students, 36 related service students, 5 UPK remote students, 8 daycare students (at our Norwich site), and are providing therapy either in-person or via teletherapy. Additionally, any of our students can join our daily UPK zoom class which will occur each day while our UPK classes are learning remotely.

We continue to practice safety and hygiene protocols which include: having fewer numbers of students in classrooms; using social distancing spaces; washing and sanitizing hands, materials and rooms; and wearing masks (all adults wear masks and students do so when possible). Staff is diligent in their sanitization efforts while still managing to provide structure, academics, and fun in the learning environment. The safety and well-being of our students, staff, and community remain our number one priority.

Please keep aware of changes in the classroom structure as our community winds its way through changes due to the pandemic requirements. As always, please contact the SES department with any concerns or questions at 723-8313.



Child Care Resource & Referral

NY CARES FOR CHILD CARE

Since March, CCR&R has been working with the Office of Children and Family Services on the distribution of New York's CARES Act funding for child care to address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the child care community. The funding has been issued in three parts, called CARES 1, CARES 2, and CARES 3.

CARES 1 Update

Parents who were essential personnel, still required to leave for work every day, and were income eligible could apply for assistance paying for child care from April – June.

Here are some highlights of the scholarship program:

- Over \$100,000 in scholarships distributed
- 76 parents were able to go to work
- 99 children were cared for in registered/licensed child care programs through Broome, Chenango, and Tioga Counties
- 37 child care programs were able to receive funding

CCR&R was able to distribute PPE and other supplies to child care programs throughout Broome, Chenango, and Tioga Counties. Supplies included masks, gloves, paper towels, toilet paper, hand sanitizer, touch-less thermometers, diapers, bleach, mops and other cleaning supplies.

- Over \$70,000 worth of supplies were purchased and distributed
- 87 child care programs through Broome, Chenango, and Tioga Counties received supplies



CARES 2 Update

In July and August, programs were able to apply to OCFS for two different grants through the New York Forward Child Care Expansion Incentive One-Time Reopening/Restructuring Grant and Temporary Operating Grant.

- 33 programs throughout Broome, Chenango, and Tioga Counties have applied for funding
- Over \$240,000 of funding is dedicated to assisting these programs with expenses of operating during the pandemic

CARES 3 Update

OCFS recently announced CARES 3 funding will include another opportunity for programs to apply for Temporary Operating Grants, similar to CARES 2. OCFS will also reinstate the Essential Personnel Scholarship program similar to CARES 1. More information will be coming out about these programs.
